A visit from Ofsted

On 19th and 20th November we were pleased to welcome a team of five Ofsted inspectors into CVC and CSF.

Our last graded inspection

was in January 2013, so this had been a long time coming and we were keen to show them what goes on in our school. The inspection itself felt remarkably intense, and the level of scrutiny was extremely thorough. Over that two day period, around fifty lessons were visited, pupils were interviewed about their learning, behaviour standards, opportunities, support and a wide range of other topics. Staff were spoken with on a similarly wide range of topics from curriculum design, to approaches to teaching, from pastoral care to safeguarding and pretty much everything else you might be able to think of. They listened to feedback from parents, pupils and staff (thank you for providing this) and observed pupils and students in class, assemblies, corridors and social spaces.



The feedback was thorough – Mrs
Lawrence and I got to sit in on their
team discussion at the end of each
day, which amounted to five hours of
discussion around the provisions and
standards here at school. It was a joy
to hear these conversations – the
inspection team really "got" our pupils
and clearly understood what goes on
in our school. And obviously, we were
really pleased that they chose to
grade us as Outstanding in each of the
five different areas of judgement. You

CURRICULUM IMMERSION DAYS

Every year, we collapse our Key Stage 3 and 4 school timetable for 2 days in October in order to give our pupils an even deeper, broader curriculum.

Our Year 7 pupils were all given the opportunities to discover more sports and activities to broaden their physical education curriculum and study the impact of climate change in an innovative, cross-curricular way.

Our Year 8 pupils took part in a variety of modern foreign language activities, including the study of ancient Italy, capoeira, salsa and Mandarin and did their field trip to study coastal erosion at Walton-on-the-Naze.

In year 9, our pupils were immersed in a more in-depth study of environmental and sustainable education through our English, Mathematics and Science departments.

Our Year 10 pupils covered core elements of their Key Stage 4 curriculum, including listening to a talk from a Holocaust survivor, learning about the dangers of on-line addiction and the discovery of a wide variety of careers through our careers carousel (over 60 employers attended!).

In Year 11, those pupils studying arts and / or technology subjects followed personalized programmes of practical examinations and controlled work in these areas.

Pupils who are studying all other subjects followed a programme of targeted revision and examination techniques in English, Mathematics, Science and Modern Foreign Languages as well as further opportunities to develop their core computing skills and, to create more balance and breadth, a practical session on CPR.

CURRICULUM IMMERSION DAYS

Walton-on-the-Naze

A Year 8 pupil gives their account of the Walton-on-the-Naze trip:

'Half of us (the X-half) went on Monday, and the other half (Y-half) visited on Tuesday. Even though it was dry, the wind was strong, but that didn't stop us from learning loads and having a great time.

The main focus of the trip was to study sea defences and coastal erosion, which we had been learning about in our geography lessons. We saw the sea defences up close and learnt how they protect the coastline from erosion and flooding.

It was amazing to see in real life what we had been discussing in class. The beach itself was fascinating, with cliffs eroding over time and the groynes stretching out into the sea.

Mr. Aitken, who led the trip, was really pleased with how well it went. He said, "It was a brilliant day, and the pupils were fantastic. Everyone behaved so well, and I'm really impressed by how much you all learnt about coastal erosion and sea defences."

Overall, the trip was a great opportunity to see geography in action and enjoy a day by the seaside!'

CORE RPE morning

Our Year 10 pupils engaged really well in our Core RPE curriculum through our RPE Conference mornings. Year 11 have now completed their compulsory RPE curriculum, they had a morning on the theme 'Relationship and Families' in September and on 'Crime and Punishment' in November. We had the pleasure of hearing from a range of speakers on these days such as a Prison Chaplain, an academic from the Faculty of Middle Eastern Studies, University of Cambridge, and West Cambridge Christian Youth Ministries alongside classroom taught lessons.

Year 10 enjoyed an RPE Conference morning during Curriculum Immersion day on the theme 'Prejudice and Discrimination' when our pupils heard from a Holocaust Survivor, Eva Clarke, and had lessons on the Civil Rights movements, Cambridge Refugee Resettlement Campaign, Human Rights and Democracy. It was a very thought-provoking day to say the least!

'The Year 11 GCSE RPE students had another successful day trip to Cambridge to visit the Eco-Mosque on Mill Road, St Barnabas Church of England Church, and finally, St Andrew's Street Baptist Church.

The sun was shining as we were given fascinating tours around these three very different religious buildings. We learnt lots more about these Christian and Muslim communities in Cambridge, the different ways they worship and the extensive ways in which they use their buildings to serve the local community and express their faith in action.

This visit brought to life what is being studied in the classroom and allowed the students to ask questions of our hosts to deepen their understanding of their course.'

Year 10 pupils developed their knowledge of different careers options and pathways, as well as exploring potential options for work experience next year. Most of the companies attending the fair had offered work experience placements in the past, including Irwin Mitchell LLP and Cambridge University Press and Assessment who organise work experience programmes within their industries.



Pupils were able to find out about apprenticeship opportunities that employers have. R G Carter, one of the largest private, familyowned construction companies in the UK, with a local office here in Comberton, were in attendance to speak to pupils about the

range of craft and management apprenticeships which they offer. The apprenticeships cover a variety of roles, including Project Managers, Quantity Surveyors, Carpenters, Plumbers, Electricians and Bricklayers.

Well done to all of our Year 10 pupils for engaging well with the employers and their great behaviour at the event and thank you to all of our employers for attending the event, many of whom were our parents/carers and alumni. Our MFL department has a strong tradition and history of success when it comes to languages competitions, and the school has held the prestigious British Council International School Award (ISA) since 2007.

The ISA is testament to our commitment to working in partnerships with schools across the globe and to developing pupils' understanding of what being a global citizen means.



At CVC we are also very proud to be holding the Rights Respecting School Award at gold level. This shows our commitment to promoting the rights of

the child, as listed in the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, which links very well with what we do during International Talent Evening.

One of the rights of the child is Article 30 (children from minority or indigenous groups), which states that: "Every child has the right to learn and use the language, customs and religion of their family, whether or not these are shared by the majority of the people in the country where they live".

The International Talent Evening is a great way to celebrate this right of the child. The evening could not happen without the support and hard work from the MFL department who start practising their song within their lessons from the beginning of term.



On Wednesday 9th October, CVC hosted its 17th International Talent Evening. The evening is one example of the many opportunities we offer to our pupils to celebrate the International Principle of the Trust.

Our Year 7 pupils join together to perform songs which they have learnt in their languages lessons during the school day.

Each year the five form groups on each side of the entire Year group (X and Y) compete against one another and the 'judges' decide on points depending on their presentation, performance and pronunciation of their words to decide which 'side' has won.

This year our Year 7 pupils embraced the event with a lot of energy and positivity, and we are all very proud of their achievements.

This year the winners on the X half was 7B and the winners on the Y half were 7N.


Thank you to all performers who provided a high standard of music to end the term and send us all away with music and Christmas cheer ringing in our ears.


SCRIMMAGE

STEM trip to Costello Medical

A Year 8 pupil reports a recent KS3 Science trip: 'A group of five year 7 and 8s went on a school trip to a company called Costello Medical in Cambridge. They are a medical communications company that take information about new medicines from pharmaceutical companies and scientific reports, analyse it to see if they are cost-effective, and present their findings to doctors so that the medicines could be given to patients. While we were there we were given lots of scientific reports about a new treatment for a disease, and we put all of the information together to make a presentation to people from the company and from other schools that were there at this event. I really enjoyed the trip as it was very informative, and it made me more aware that there are lots of different jobs in STEM and not just jobs in laboratories.'

SCIENCE MOVES FROM THE LAB TO THE LIBRARY!

On Saturday 9th November, children of St Neots experienced a morning of science demonstrations and hands-on STEM activities at the St Neots Library Science Day, part of the Cambridgeshire Libraries events programme for children and families (see their Facebook page).



Dr Anna Hansford, Senior Science Technician, introduced 40 children aged 6-12 (and their guardians!) to the wonders of the microscopic world, showing them cat and human hairs, cat fleas, plant stomata (the 'breathing holes' of plants) and yeast under the microscope. The children also got hands-on with activities involving fun experiments with light, saw everyday items such as material and print in close-up using phones and moved model robotic arms using hydraulics.

The Science Day was organised by Dr Lui-Roberts, the activities were delivered by Dr Lui-Roberts, Dr Hansford, engineers from Bosch Rexroth St Neots and two local young people who all volunteered their time, and the laboratory equipment was kindly loaned by the CVC Science department.

It was great to see such young children enthused by STEM subjects, and we hope we get to show them even more at CVC in the future!

GCSE HISTORY MUNICH TRIP

Recently, we were fortunate enough to visit the city of Munich, as part of the Year 11 history trip.

In Year 10, as part of our GCSE course, we study Nazi Germany and therefore visiting the city brought to life the words we'd only seen on a textbook.

On the first day, our tour guide, Rob, showed us around the city of Munich, highlighting some areas of significance such as memorials and the famous beer hall where Hitler delivered his 1923 speech.



On the second day, we spend more time in Munich, visiting the Jewish museum, the university where the white rose group carried out their opposition and the area where the Jewish book burnings took place. We also visited the Munich Christmas market, where we bought lovely ornaments, and ate traditional German food, our favourite being the Kartoffelpuffer!

On the third day we traveled 2 hours to Nuremberg, where we visited the courthouse where the Nuremberg trials were held, alongside the rally grounds. We then visited the Nuremberg Christmas markets, where just as much money was spent, and just as much food was eaten.



On our fourth and final day, we visited the Dachau memorial site, which was an educating and touching visit that we recommend everyone to visit. We then caught our flight back to Heathrow, bringing our wonderful trip to a close.

SANEMI PARASHAR WINNER OF THE CHILDREN AND YOUNG PERSON OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

This award recognises a deaf child or young person with hearing loss who has gone above and beyond to demonstrate that deaf children can achieve their potential. Sanemi Parashar (12) was born profoundly deaf and had cochlear implant surgery at 15 months, followed by a reimplant less than a year later. She was supported to learn to listen and speak as a young child with Auditory Verbal therapy on Auditory Verbal UK's family programme. Despite having balance issues she overcame this and other hurdles, persevering in developing her speech and language skills to achieve age appropriate spoken language.

Always keen to help others Sanemi promotes charity work at school where she is on the school council, is an ambassador and mentor for <u>Advanced Bionics</u> (cochlear implant manufacturer) and supports and volunteers for the <u>Emmeline Centre</u> at Addenbrookes Hospital in Cambridge, a specialist Hearing Implant Centre.

Sanemi is also involved with the <u>Cambridge</u> and <u>Huntingdon Deaf Children's Society</u>, a volunteer with the <u>BEARS</u> cochlear implant trial to help children and young people with cochlear implants hear better and even raised money while on holiday with the Rotary Club of India and T5CC Bakery as well as meeting implant surgeons and the rehab team at the local hospital.



She is excelling at school, learning two foreign languages as well as Indian dance and is always outspoken about the impact of deafness alongside challenging perceptions of what deaf young people can achieve.

On receiving her award Sanemi said: "I am absolutely delighted to have been a finalist with some amazing young people sharing a similar journey like mine, and it feels wonderful to have won this award. I am fortunate to have all the required support and care from my family, all professionals, and AVUK who have helped me express myself with the power of speech. The award motivates me even further to continue supporting other children who are less fortunate than me."

CVC FRIENDS' CHRISTMAS FAYRE

We are proud to be celebrating our 40th year of fundraising!

This term has been a busy one during which, along with our wonderful volunteers, we have raised £3,545 and donated a total of £6,417 to a variety of projects that will benefit the pupils and sixth form students.



CVC PUPILS CONTRIBUTE TO CAMBRIDGESHIRE STUDENT FORUM

On Thursday 14th November, the first Summit of this year's Cambridgeshire Student Forum took place. The summit was kindly hosted by St Mary's School, Cambridge.

Cambridgeshire Student Forum includes 38 participants from 7 institutions from across Cambridgeshire including ourselves, Abbey College, Cambridge Academy for Science and Technology, Hills Road Sixth Form College, Sawston Village College, St Andrew's College, and St Mary's School.

The event comprises pupils being posed big overarching questions such as, 'What would you like to change about your school, community, city or county, and why?' pupils created presentations around key controversial ideas around social action, such as the existence of graffiti in our communities and how to promote greener options for travelling across a busy city like Cambridge. These ideas fed into action groups being formed across the schools, with the task of returning for the second summit with ideas from pupils' own schools!

Comberton Village College (CVC) (Chloe, Eilidh, Josh, Morven, Purvi and Thea) shared a few initiatives the institution has, including surveys, with a recent one looking at sexism in the PE curriculum; clubs such as eco-club and equality and diversity, the sharing of resources, including sign-posting for mental health, and Student Leadership, where there are many roles for people to amplify student voice whilst gaining personal skills. At Key Stage 3, there are Form, Charity and Sports

Representatives; at Key Stage 4 there

are Prefects who look at different events of school life, such as mental health and

sustainability.
