

## RELIGION, PHILOSOPHY AND ETHICS GCSE RPE Curriculum (OCR Exam Board)

The OCR GCSE Course is divided into:

- 2 in-depth studies of Religion (PAPER 1)
  - Christianity Beliefs, Teachings and Practices (J625/01)
  - o Islam Beliefs, Teachings and Practices (J625/02)
- Ethical Themes (PAPER 2), where students explore ethical and philosophical concepts through the perspective of Christianity (J625/06).
  - Religion, Peace and Conflict
  - $\circ~$  Relationships and Families
  - o The Existence of God, gods and the ultimate reality
  - o Dialogue between religious and non-religious beliefs and attitudes

## Final GCSE Exams (100% exam assessment)

Final assessment at the end of the GCSE course takes place in 2 external GCSE exams. There are 3 types of questions which pupils are examined on: 3-mark, 6-mark and 15-marks questions.

The break-down of topics for Paper 1 & Paper 2, and timing, is as follows:

- Paper 1: Christianity and Islam Beliefs, Teachings and Practices (2 hours)
- Paper 2: 4x Ethics Themes (2 hours)
